

Sharing the Results of Action (and Other) Research: Applied Strategies for Practitioners and Scholars

Session Facilitator:

Dr. Craig A. Mertler Barry University

Description: Many researchers—whether practitioners or scholars, novice or experienced—often struggle with the notion and practice of formally disseminating or otherwise informally sharing the results of their research endeavors. This session will focus on sharing processes and practical guidelines for tried-and-true modes of dissemination—namely, publishing in refereed journals and presenting at academic conferences. However, most of the session will be spent examining the potential use of alternative and less-common methods of disseminating research results. These include informal presentation formats, posters, infographics, various social media outlets (Twitter/X, Facebook, LinkedIn, Instagram), podcasts, YouTube and Vimeo, blogs, vlogs, personal websites, zines, and editorials. Included in the discussions will be various best practices and other guidelines for using these outlets. Session participants will have opportunities to try some of these strategies and to begin to develop individual dissemination plans for themselves and their work.

Facilitator Biography: Dr. Craig A. Mertler is an Associate Professor of Action Research and Quantitative Methods at Barry University in Miami and has been an educator for 38 years, 28 of those in higher education, and 12 as an administrator (department chair, doctoral program director, and education dean). He teaches courses focused on the application of action research to promote educator empowerment, school improvement, and job-embedded professional development, as well as quantitative research methods and statistical analysis. He has served as the research methodology expert on more than 120 doctoral dissertations and master's theses.

Dr. Mertler is the author of 9 textbooks (including four books on action research, as well as others on educational research methods, multivariate analyses, classroom assessment, and data-driven instructional decision making), 9 invited book chapters, 25 refereed journal articles, and 3 novels. He has presented more than 40 research papers at professional conferences and has delivered 25 keynote or other types of invited addresses. He has consulted with numerous schools, districts, and universities on the implementation of context-specific and situated action research. For roughly the past 20 years, much of Dr. Mertler's work has centered on the practice of implementing action research (i.e., practitioner research) in PK-12 schools and higher education settings. He has conducted numerous inservice training sessions on the action research process for school districts and IHEs in numerous states around the country, as well as internationally.

Description: This panel will cover the process employed in establishing the achievement level cut scores on the scales of FAST and BEST assessments. A practical application of the bookmark method for standard setting will be described.

Biography: Dr. Gary Phillips is Vice President of psychometrics at Cambium Assessment. He conducts research that advances the state-of-the art in statistical and psychometric techniques, including work on statistical linking and international benchmarking. He received his PhD from the University of Kentucky with joint training from the College of Education and Department of Statistics. He is the author of several hundreds of conference paper presentations and publications in journals such as the Educational Researcher, Educational Measurement: Issues and Practice, and Applied Psychological Measurement. Dr. Phillips previously served as the Acting Commissioner of the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), U.S. Department of Education where he was a member of the Senior Executive Service and directed the work of the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), the Trends in International Mathematics and Science Study (TIMSS), and the Program for International Student Assessment (PISA).

Biography: Dr. Catherine Close is Vice President of Psychometrics at Renaissance Learning. She leads her team that works on assessments, primarily computerized adaptive tests (CAT) and curriculum-based measures in the K-12 space. In the last 11+ years, she has focused on interim assessments that help the classroom teacher make sound data-driven instructional decisions. She also serves on standards advisory groups and technical advisory committees, most recently for OFQUAL in England and NAEP.

Presentation: How to do Thematic Analysis without Coding **Presenter:** Dr. Jennifer R. Wolgemuth, University of South Florida

Description: Despite thematic analysis' associations with coding, there are many ways qualitative researchers can get to themes. Themes irrupt in 'ah ha!' moments; come to us in dreams; linger at the back of our minds until inspiration calls them forth; are conjured in our reading, writing, and listening to data. It's hard to explain, let alone write, about these manifestations of themes though, so we tend to push them aside as unimportant. But taking them seriously opens possibilities, moves a technical account of thematic analysis toward one of technicity. In this talk we privilege technicity and explore non-coding and creative approaches to thematic analysis. Each approach is featured in an upcoming edited book, Expanding Approaches to Thematic Analysis: Creative Engagements with Qualitative Data, whose fundamental premise is, "You do not have to code to get to themes. Seriously. You don't."

Biography: Jennifer R. Wolgemuth is an associate professor in educational research at the University of South Florida where she directs the Graduate Certificate in Qualitative Research. Her research agenda focuses on ethics and validity in social science research. Drawing on critical, poststructural, and new materialist theories, she explores inquiry as an agential process that simultaneously investigates and creates lives and communities to and for which the researcher is responsible.

What is Fairness in Educational Testing?

Speaker: Dr. Stephen Sireci, University of Massachusetts, Amherst

Description: The Standards for Educational and Psychological Testing define fairness using four "perspectives," but they were written over a decade ago and since that time concerns of fairness in testing have become commonplace. In this presentation, I review current concerns regarding fairness in testing and different definitions and conceptualizations of fairness and unfairness. I then describe more contemporary notions of fairness in testing that require consideration of the cultural, sociocognitive, and personal characteristics of ALL students in the population to be tested. Contemporary notions embrace the concepts of culturally responsive assessment and UNDERSTANDardization. The concept of fairness described by the International Test Commission and the Association of Test Publishers in the Guidelines for Technology-Based Assessments (2022), which claims "Fairness in testing requires test developers to consider the wide diversity of needs and potential inequities within the tested population in all aspects of testing," will be emphasized.

Bio: Stephen G. Sireci, Ph.D.is Distinguished University Professor and Executive Director of the Center for Educational Assessment in the College of Education at the University of Massachusetts Amherst. He is known for his research in evaluating test fairness, particularly issues related to content validity, test bias, cross-lingual assessment, standard setting, and technology-based assessment. He has authored/coauthored over 160 publications, and is the co-architect of the multistage-adaptive Massachusetts Adult Proficiency Tests. He is a Fellow of the American Educational Research Association, and of Division 5 of the American Psychological Association; Past-President of the National Council on Measurement in Education, and President of the International Test Commission. He recently co-edited the <u>Guidelines for Technology-Based Assessments</u> (ITC & ATP, 2022).

- Dr. Meg Atha is an Assistant Professor of Research, Assessment, and Measurement at Florida Gulf Coast University in Fort Myers, FL. She is trained in educational psychology, educational measurement, assessment, evaluation, and research methodologies. My own research examines educational contexts that promote the most creativity, joy, and playfulness in educational experiences because together they promote increased student motivation and engagement as well as draw out critical thinking skills required for 21st-century living.
- Dr. Michelle Vaughan is an Associate Professor at Florida Atlantic University. She teaches courses in curriculum design, action research, and school reform. She received her Ed.D. in Curriculum and Instruction from the Department of Curriculum, Culture, and Educational Inquiry at Florida Atlantic University. Prior to FAU, Dr. Vaughan served as a curriculum manager for Florida Virtual School, overseeing online course writing and design for one of the largest K12 online schools in the nation. Her scholarship explores teacher growth and change through action research, online learning, and the integration of technology into practice. She works with local school districts to train teachers in curriculum design and inclusion strategies. School and Classroom Growth Models: What are they and how can they be useful?
